Shakespeare's Globe, 21 New Globe Walk, London SE1 9DT

Next to the River Thames is Shakespeare's Globe. The Globe is a copy of the theatre where William Shakespeare worked as an actor and a writer. The original theatre (also called The Globe) was destroyed by a fire in the 17th century; this version opened in 1997.

Seeing a play at the Globe is very different from a visit to a regular theatre. Firstly there is no electricity: the stage is lit by candles during evening performances, and all music comes from instruments used in Shakespeare's time.



Secondly, the stage and the seats are all outdoors. Rain doesn't stop performances, so check the weather forecast before you go, and dress appropriately! Finally, there are only a small number of seats; most of the audience stands to watch the plays. Tickets for the standing area cost only £5, while it's £25 to watch while sitting.

One thing that has changed is that women are allowed to act in plays, unlike in Shakespeare's time when men and boys played the female roles!
